When your patient has a learning disability

It is widely recognised that people with learning disabilities have a greater number of health problems than most of the rest of the population and are more likely to be admitted to hospital.

They may need additional support to enable them to understand and co-operate in their care and treatment.

As such, you, your team, the patient, their family or carers may need:

- Support to help them understand aspects of their care.
- Support to prepare for an appointment or admission.
- More support or advice on meeting their needs while they are at the hospital.
- Support to plan for aftercare / discharge.
- Advice regarding mental capacity and best interest decision making.
